newspaper about them, Dr. Cohn's mom


would cut it out for him to read over his breakfast cereal.

of becoming a heart surgeon...and an inventor! He is most proud of the inventions he's created that help surgeons do their jobs better. To remind himself of how far he's come, he displays his first invention on the

wall: a spoon-like device that makes heart surgery less invasive. His latest invention helps prevent blood clots from forming in the hearts of certain kinds of patients. It's called the Lariat, and it looks a little like a fishing pole combined with a cowboy rope.

Today, Dr. Cohn is Director of Minimally Invasive Surgical Technology and Associate Director for Laboratory Surgery Research at the Texas Heart Institute. Don't think it's all work all the time though. Dr. Cohn plays trombone in two bands, has been on an ABC reality show called "Miracle Workers," and has five children.
